Professor Richard Murphy

Critic of globalisation and campaigner for equitable tax systems

Richard Murphy is a Visiting Professor at Sheffield University Management School and Anglia Ruskin University's Global Environment Institute following five years as a Professor of Practice in International Political Economy at City University of London. Richard is a UK chartered accountant and political economist whose main areas of research relate to taxation and its impact on local, national and international economies and the relationships within and between them.

He was a practising chartered accountant and corporate director for more than 20 years before becoming a campaigner for the Tax Justice Network. He combines his current role with

directorships of Tax Research UK and the Corporate Accountability Network, and writes a daily blog on these issues.

Richard's work has been widely used by politicians and regulators. He was the creator of the country-by-country reporting concept that became one of the OECD's recommended bases for reporting by profitable multinationals on tax payments in 2014 in an attempt to beat profit shifting and tax avoidance by those companies.

Richard has made regular news appearances on BBC 1, BBC News Channel, Newsnight, Channel 4 and ITV.
