100,000 and more

As some might have noticed, yesterday was a little busy here. 36,000 people called, after 33,000 the day before. The usually is a bit over 20,000.


The result of all the discussion was that I moderated my 300,000 published comment on this blog.

If those comments had been spread evenly over the life of the blog, that would have been a bit over 44 a day. Of course, that is not the way the comments have spread themselves out. They run pretty much proportional to reads.

There have been 37.6 million reads here, in total, averaging over 600,000 a month at present. So, right now, comments run at an average of over 160 a day. There are the unpublished comments to note as well - although they tend to take less time. Spam filters get rid of a lot of them, as does blocking those considered to be trolls. But I suspect one in 10 gets deleted by me because they are trolling, wildly off-topic, or repetitive, which leads to a ban for trolling, offensive, or they create risk for me as a publisher. Running a moderated blog is a time-consuming task.

There were other notable numerical events yesterday. Yesterday's video has had over 150,000 views so far, with that figure still rising quite fast.

And that helped tip us over 100,000 followers on YouTube, which not many channels achieve, let alone in eight months, which we have in effect, done. YouTube will actually issue us with a plaque in due course. And yes, I am pleased about that, but the plaque is going to Thomas, without whose work as editor that could not have happened. I just talk into a camera. He does the hard work. He also screenshot this:



And after all that, do I regret suggesting that the City conspired to deliver what Musk wants, which is a crisis for Labour? No, I don't, not in the slightest. That's because I think that is what they did.
